

Overview

- The walk to Emmaus is one of the resurrection narratives in the Gospel of John (Lk. 24: 13-35). The walk was difficult. It was a journey from a painful past to a future that seemed to be unpromising.
- But something beautiful happened unexpectedly. Jesus walked with them. He walked with them in their grief and loss. He walked with them in their doubts and fears. He walked with them in their blindness and utter desperation. Jesus gave the disciples a new start, a new beginning, a new hope.
- Living out the social teachings of Pope Francis, 'Laudato Si' is a "walk" we need to take. It is a difficult journey because of the many challenges we need to face to protect our common home, the EARTH, especially in this time of pandemic. Though we may have our doubts, fears and blindness, Jesus is here with us to guide us in our journey, "the creator does not abandon us; He never forsakes in His loving plan or repents of having created us. Humanity still has the ability to work together in building our common home' (LS # 13).

This "Emmaus Walk" is divided into 3 parts:

 REFLECTION ("Jesus interpreted to them what referred to Him in all the Scripture" Lk.24:27)



• COMMUNION ("While He was with them at table, He took bread, said the blessing, broke it and gave it to them" Lk. 24:30)



 MISSION ("Were not our hearts burning within us while He talked with us on the road and opened the Scriptures to us? They GOT UP and returned at once to Jerusalem" Lk.24:31-33)





REFLECTION:

- Meditate on St. Francis 'Canticle of the Creatures' (LS # 87)
- Find out for yourselves the barriers that keep you from finding "Sabbath Rest"

COMMUNION:

- Renew your commitment to the Lord's Day (Sunday Mass) by dedicating time for prayer and reflection and for resting with family and friends
- Pray 'A Christian Prayer in Union with Creator ' (can be found at the end of the encyclical LS)

MISSION:

- Recycle and save energy
- 'Unplug' for 1hour and reconnect with nature

REFLECTION


- Study Pope Francis encyclical, Laudato Si

- Read the book of Carl Honore's book, 'In Praise of Slow' (2004)

COMMUNION

- Pray Psalm 148
- Pray 'A Christian Prayer in Union with Creator ' (Can be found at the end of the encyclical LS)

MISSION

- Pick up a trash while taking a walk
- Find local group in your community that work for environmental conservation
- Encourage groups at your parish to use real dishes at parish functions
- Go for a walk and spend time in the natural world
- Cultivate a healthy and simple living
- Choose a day to take a block of time to attend "on line Mass", pray the Rosary or spend time in unhurried silent prayer.



Lectio Divina

Lectio Divina is a reflective and prayerful reading of Sacred Scripture in the
context of the Church's understanding of the Word of God. Begin with finding a
quiet place and letting go in your mind all the busyness of the world. For each
individual text below, read it slowly and prayerfully to get a sense of the whole
text, opening yourself to what God may be saying to you. After a short period of
silence, read the text again before reflecting on the following questions. Think
about the scriptural text in the context of your own life and experience. Share
what is on your mind and in your heart as if you are speaking with a close friend
or a spouse.

Opening Prayer:

• Canticle of Saint Francis Praised be you, my Lord, with all your creatures, especially Sir Brother Sun, who is the day and through whom you give us light. And he is beautiful and radiant with great splendor; and bears a likeness of you, Most High. Praised be you, my Lord, through Sister Moon and the stars, in heaven you formed them clear and precious and beautiful. Praised be you, my Lord, through Brother Wind, and through the air, cloudy and serene, and every kind of weather through whom you give sustenance to your creatures Praised be you, my Lord, through Sister Water, who is very useful and humble and precious and chaste. Praised be you, my Lord, through Brother Fire, through whom you light the night, and he is beautiful and playful and robust and strong. Praised be You, my Lord, through Sister Mother Earth, who sustains us and governs us and who produces varied fruits with colored flowers and herbs. . . . Praise and bless my Lord, and give him thanks and serve him with great humility. Amen.

Read the following Sacred Scriptures:

Genesis chapters 1-3 of Genesis.


• Which passage means the most to you and why? What does God say about what he has made? What does God say to us about what he has created? What consequence does the sin of Adam and Eve have upon humanity in our lives, our social relations, upon the environment and how we interact with the world and each other? Can the world truly be a Garden again in the presence of sin?

Luke 12:13-34.

• Is there a word, phrase or passage that made you stop or strikes you as beautiful, inspiring or challenging? What does the foolish rich man say to us about how we use the goods of the earth? While we store up treasures for ourselves, acquiring more than we really need, are we denying other people the food and other resources that they need? What does this passage teach us about our anxieties and the providence of God?

Concluding Prayer: Prayer of Pope Francis for Our Earth

• All-powerful God, you are present in the whole universe and in the smallest of your creatures. You embrace with your tenderness all that exists. Pour out upon us the power of your love, that we may protect life and beauty. Fill us with peace that we may live as brothers and sisters, harming no one. O God of the poor, help us to rescue the abandoned and forgotten of this earth, so precious in your eyes. Bring healing to our lives, that we may protect the world and not prey on it, that we may sow beauty, not pollution and destruction. Touch the hearts of those who look only for gain at the expense of the poor and the earth. Teach us to discover the worth of each thing, to be filled with awe and contemplation, to recognize that we are profoundly united with every creature as we journey towards your infinite light. We thank you for being with us each day. Encourage us, we pray, in our struggle for justice, love and peace. Amen

 - What are the ways you can do to protect our common home the earth?




- Draw planet earth. Decorate the earth with plants and animals that you like.
